The Vice-President shall assist the President in the conduct of the affairs of the Chapter and shall:

a. Assume the duties of the President in the event of the President's absence or inability to serve in his office.

b. Make arrangements for and assure necessary insurance coverage for all events.

c. Be responsible for coordinating social events for the Chapter in conjunction with the Social Events Chair and/or appointed committees.

d. Have oversight of the Chapter website regarding posting of events.

e. Shall turn over all Chapter assets, accounts, records, etc. to successors as directed by the Board of Directors.

If you have a desire to be involved in the inner workings and guidance of the chapter, I would strongly suggest you put you name in the hat. Send an email with your name, membership number, position you are running for and a short biography of yourself to **nominations@houston-bmwcca.com**.

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LSD Differential Rebuild with 4-plates - Part 3

Output Flange Bearings and Seals

Replacing the output flange seals is recommended. Note the depth of the seal from the outside. Push the old seal out, a suitable piece of PVC piping with plate and plastic hammer, worked well. A hammer and punch can also be used.

The bearing race is removed with a punch. Note the position of the race to the inside edge of the flange. Heat the outside of the flange quickly with a propane torch. The idea is to warm the outside quickly to maximize the temperature differential between the flange and race. This expands the flange more than the race so removal is easier. Once hot use a punch and tap around to remove the race.

To install the new race, clean the bore and check the entry for any burr at the edge, dress with sandpaper if needed. Clean the bore and wipe off the race. Wipe a small amount of differential oil on the race OD. The race can be put in the freezer, but it is not necessary as it is easy to heat the flange ID. Heat the ID to about 130 to 150F. Use the old race to drive the new race in, tap around to keep the race square as it enters the bore. Compare the depth to the other flange to be sure it is fully seated. Repeat the installation for the other side.

Start by assembling the differential with the original shims. Oil both bearings using differential oil. No Loctite at this point, that will be done later. Install the driver side shim and the passenger shim with six bolts on the driver side. Hand tighten the bolts. The M8 grade 8.8 bolt torque is only 22Nm (16.2 ft-lbs), don't overtighten. On the passenger side just put every other bolt to save time, and run them in hand tight. Turn the LSD and make sure it turns freely. Compare by feel to the resistance initially on the drive before it was taken apart. If it binds, stop, the shim on the passenger side will need to be thicker. If it turns too easily, the passenger shim will need to be thinner. The goal is to have a bearing preload of 4000N (899 lb). If it feels in the ball park, tighten the passenger bolts. Using the $\frac{1}{4}$ " torque wrench; do a torque test. Try it several times. If it is below 22 inlbs, then the bearing preload is too light. Above 24 in-lbs, the preload is too high.

Remove the passenger shim and check the thickness. Using a caliper select the next thicker or thinner shim as needed. If you are new to this, select one thicker and one thinner, and try them both to get a feel for the correct preload. This approach can produce a good result without the special tools BMW recommends.

The final check is to fully torque all six (6) bolts. Re-check the input torque. If it is 22- 24 in-lbs, then the shims are good.

We now need to confirm the position of the ring gear. This is done with the backlash. Remember the test we did initially? That was to give us a known starting point. This differential was known to run good and the backlash was pretty much spot on.

In the event the backlash is not acceptable the shim on the driver side will be increased or decreased, AND the shim on the passenger will be changed. The total of both shims must stay the same,

Next the side shims need to be checked and a potentially changed. The shims can be purchased as a set, or shims can be found in a "donor" differential. The BMW parts database lists a large set and a small set. Both are available through dealers.

The small set, PN 33139065734 contains shims from 1.45 to 1.69mm, 9 Pieces. The large set, PN 33139065735 contains shims from 1.72 to 1.96mm. The increment is .03mm (.0012in). To be fully prepared you need both sets. or the bearing preload will be changed. Increase the driver shim to increase the backlash (move the gear teeth apart). Decrease the driver shim to decrease the backlash, moving the gears closer together. For this differential I installed the next thinner shim on the passenger side only.

BMW says the backlash should be .0024 to .0055 in. I target .004 to .005.

Use a dial indicator with a magnetic base. Position the indicator as so as to put the put the pointer normal to the gear tooth, similar to the picture. The indicator and base shown are inexpensive from Harbor Freight Tools.

This differential was just about perfect at .0045. Last thing to check is the pattern. Apply the gear paint and turn a few cycles. BMW provides a figure in the TIS illustrating poor patterns. Since we checked the gears initially, on a known good drive, we just need it to be the same.

Once the gear pattern is good, remove the LSD and install the speedometer trigger wheel. Heat the inside of the wheel with a propane torch. Leather gloves are recommended. Carefully tap on, keeping the wheel level or it will pop off. Use a punch and fully seat. Visually check the wheel for any bent tangs.

Install the side bolt flanges and Loctite in place. Note that a couple of the holes are through drilled, so without the Loctite the final drive will weep oil. Use blue Loctite and torque the bolts. I suggest install three (3) bolts each side, and then the others. Once all six (6) have been installed with Loctite, tighten to final torque in a cross pattern with a torque wrench.

The rear cover is next. BMW uses a paper gasket, which was damaged when the final drive was opened. I use Permatex/Loctite 515 or 518 sealant, which is similar to the sealant used on transmission cases and Porsche engine cases. Note that this type sealant is activated by ferrous material, so will fully cure in this application (steel case and aluminum cover) without a primer.

Torque the bolts to the recommended torque, M10 8.8, 45Nm (33 ft-lbs) in a cross pattern. I like to leave it 24 hours for full cure before putting in oil, so install the final drive back in the car before filling with oil.

Make sure the differential is level and fill to the bottom thread (small trickle runs out) of the upper plug hole. BMW torque is pretty high (70Nm or 52 ft-lbs), I suggest about 35 - 40 ft-lbs and prefer to hand tighten with feel of the aluminum crush ring.

Test Driving

With the final drive back in the car, some easy driving should be done to break in. The first thing to do is go to an empty parking lot and do 10 to 20 of almost full lock figure 8's at low speed 1st or 2nd gear (15 -20mph). Do also some larger circles. There should be no chatter or noise heard. Next resist the temptation to jump on it and do some fairly gentle normal driving. Try to get at least a 100 miles or so before using it hard. After about 1200 miles, I suggest a fluid change, following BMW M maintenance recommendations.

How did it work?

Great. Hitting the throttle with both wheels driving really does work better. Hard cornering is more stable, and the car just seems to hold a tighter line. Braking also feels better. The car just simply feels connected. Overall a lot of bang for the buck. Check Donovan's (no. 911) times on the club website from the Oct. 2014 or Jan. 2015 Autocross.

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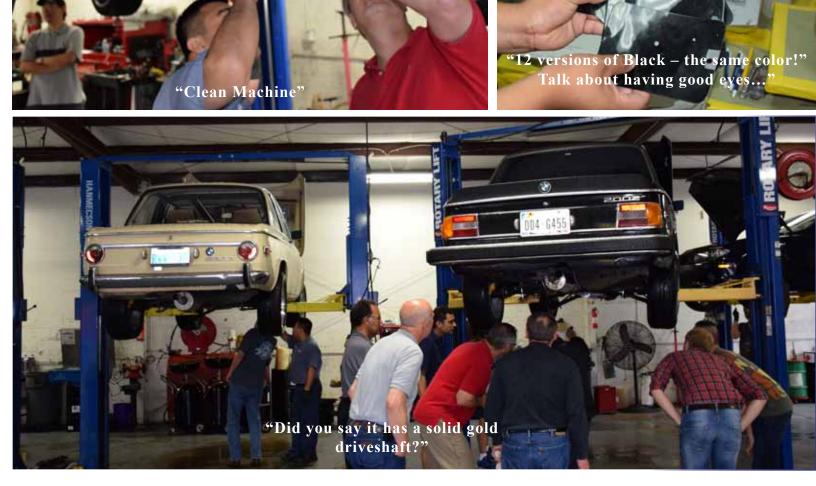
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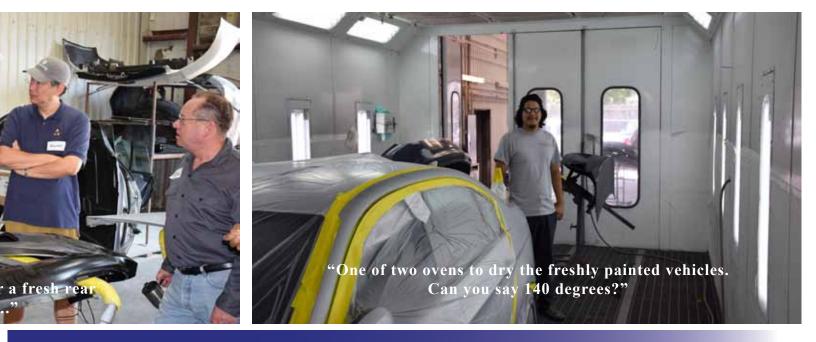
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SKIN GAMES NEIL BAER

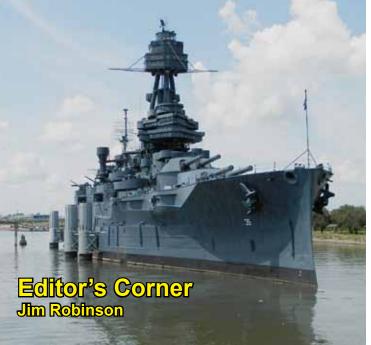
What we all agreed on was the hospitality of Alain Dikdan and his team was fantastic and we look forward to the next visit.
